# Spinks blase

**NEW YORK (Reuter)** — Michael Spinks could not care less about being stripped of his light-heavyweight boxing title and will fight exclusively as a heavyweight, defending the crown he took from Larry Holmes, his manager said on Saturday.

"We are going after the big bucks now!" manager Butch Lewis told Reuters in a telephone interview. He added: "Hell — the last time Michael fought as a light heavy, we got \$US100,000 (\$A142,060) — that's chump change. We got \$US1.1 million (\$A1.56 million) for fighting Larry and now the bread is going to flow." Spinks became the first light-heavyweight champion in history to take the heavyweight title when he defeated Holmes in a close decision in Las Vegas last month. But last Wednesday the World Boxing Council (W.B.C.) lifted Spink's title, ruling he could not put two weight brackets at the same time. Lewis said Spinks will also surrender the International Boxing Federation (I.B.F.) light-heavy title.

# Double trouble

**PEKING (Reuter)** — Two Japanese twin brothers dominated the fifth Peking marathon yesterday and clocked the same time, a course record. Shigeru So took first place in 2 hours 10.23 seconds with brother Takeshi at his shoulder, cheered on by 60,000 joyous spectators in the city's Workers' Stadium. Third was Britain's Hugh Jones, winner of the 1982 London Marathon and 12th in the 1984 Olympic race, in a time of 2:10.36. Jones and the two Sos broke away from the other 231 runners at the 22 km mark. The So twins pulled away from Jones after 40km and surged together to the finish.

# Prestige for Kelly

**Paris (Reuter)** — Sean Kelly's victory in the Tour of Lombardy cycling race on Saturday brought the Irish cyclist the super prestige award for overall performance for the second year in succession. Kelly, who had trailed Australian Phil Anderson by 39 points before Saturday's final race of the series, gained 60 points from his win to take his tally to 309 points. Anderson was second and American Greg Lemond, runner-up in the Tour de France, third.

# Annacone a rising star in rankings

**BRISBANE — Top-seeded American Paul Annacone emerged as a worthy challenger to the world's tennis elite with a convincing straight-sets win in the final of the \$100,000 G.W.A. Mazda tennis classic at Chandler yesterday.**

"I was a step slower today and you can't afford that against a player like him," Evernden said later.

Annacone, who was beaten by John McEnroe in the Atlanta final in

March, has rocketed up the world ratings from 94 to 18 in the past 12 months.

Australian sports psychologist Norm Blundell, who was at the University of Tennessee two years ago, has played a major part in Annacone's rapid rise up the rankings.

"He got me over a hump in concentration," Annacone said. "I was inconsistent mentally and he did a great job forcing me to focus on the task at hand."

Annacone said he got "madder than mad" when he read there were no young Americans coming out the tennis scene.

"We have more tennis players than you can shake a stick at," he said. "I'm sick of hearing there's no good young tennis players coming up."

Annacone listed Scott Davis, Brad Gilbert and Ben Testerman as some of the rising stars on the horizon.

Yesterday's win is unlikely to improve his ranking but a \$16,000 winners' cheque should prove adequate compensation.

# Brilliant classic ride by Leach

**WARRNAMBOOL —** Bankstown cyclist Brad Leach scored a brilliant win in the 70th annual 260 km Melbourne to Warrnambool road cycling classic yesterday.

rowly defeating national titleholder Lawrie Venn and the Warrnambool record holder, Wayne Hildred, of New Zealand, and David Allan.

Riding from the 30-minute mark chasing a limit of 60 minutes, Leach broke away with his co-marker, former Sun Tour of Victoria winner Ken Evans, with just six kilometres to go.

A crash nine kilometres from the start involving eight riders in the 10-minute bunch put paid to the chances of that group.

Leach (22) was too strong in the uphill sprint, defeating the 34-year-old Geelong veteran Evans by four lengths, with another Geelong rider, Neil Wilson, a further six lengths away third.

Michael Crowe, of Cootamundra, N.S.W., was taken to hospital and South African Alan Dipple also suffered injuries.

It was only the third win in the classic by a N.S.W. rider, following the victories by Arthur Julius, in 1951, and Rodney Crowe in 1968.

The 30-minute bunch had the race sewn up long before the finish and came in 13 minutes ahead of the scratch group.

Leach's winning time was the fastest by a rider off a handicap mark for five years. Dual Sun Tour winner Terry Hammond won the sprint for fastest time nar-

In Sydney, 20-year-old Dutch ace Ed Schurer triumphed over appalling conditions to squeeze to a 30-second win in the marathonic Commonwealth Bank Cycle Classic yesterday.

Torrential-rain and gale-force winds forced several riders to retire on the final stage of the gruelling 1300 km race.

When the riders left Newcastle yesterday morning for the final 150 km road stage to Hornsby, on Sydney's northern outskirts, Schurer led by a mere 14 seconds.

Strong challenges were expected from the Victorian Repco team with Olympian Michael Lynch only 35 seconds off the pace.

But the atrocious conditions put paid to attacks on the leaders, and within a few kilometres of the start seven riders retired.

The three King of the Mountain stages yesterday morning posed no threat to the top mountain climber, Atle Pedersen (Norway).

Pedersen was second to Brian Fowler (N.Z.) in the first climb, the positions were reversed on the second climb and Dave Mann won the third.
