## Surprise win for Qld rider

Queensland rider, Steven Hope, became the new Australian Motor Cycle Trials Champion with an unexpected win ahead of former national champion Paul Symons, of Victoria, at the national titles at Spreyton yesterday.

Symons was favoured to take out his second title in succession.

Hope (27) led the first day's competition on Saturday by the slender margin of six points and yesterday consolidated his position to defeat the reigning champion by a comfortable 17 points.

Well-known Mobil Holden dealer team racing driver and current Tasmanian trials champion, David Parsons, finished best among the local entries in ninth position overall.

Hope, riding a Yamaha TY 350 bike, said he found the course to be one of the most difficult he had experienced in his 10 years of competitive trials riding.

"Some of the Saturday sections were so hard they were almost dangerous," he said.

"Today's sections were to the other extreme with wet and muddy conditions, which still made the bikes hard to control.

"I expected Paul (Symons) to win - so I'm pleasantly surprised."

David Parsons, by finishing ninth in the open section yesterday, improved 11 places from 20th at last year's national titles in South Australia.

## MELBOURNE - Caulfield Cup winner Tristar will become only the second of her sex to take the prestigious double if successful in next month's Melbourne Cup.

The gallant four-year-old mare picked up Saturday's \$502,000 Foster's Caulfield Cup with a magnificent run that saw her head off Our Sophia right on the finish line.

The only mare to complete the cup double was Rivette in 1939 - as a six-year-old and carrying only 7.2 (45.5 kg) in the Caulfield Cup and 7.9 (48.5 kg) in the Melbourne Cup.

Tristar carried 50.5 kg and is weighted on 49.5 kg in the Melbourne Cup with a penalty for Saturday's victory forthcoming.

And the bay mare could be penalised up to 4.5 kg for the Caulfield Cup success. However, Tristar is certainly bred to stay the gruelling 3200 m of the \$1,025,000 Foster's Melbourne Cup run at Flemington tomorrow fortnight.

She is by Sir Tristram - sire of Gurner's Lane which captured the Caulfield and Melbourne Cup double in 1982 - and from an Arctic Explorer mare called Renarc.

Arctic Explorer is the sire of the 1970 Sydney Cup (3200 m) winner Arctic Symbol.

In Saturday's win, Tristar (5-1 equal fav.) held off Our Sophia (5-1 equal fav.) to score by a head - with Lacka Reason (14-1), 1 1/4 length away third.

After the win, trainer Ross McDonald confirmed the Melbourne Cup was the real aim.

"Her main mission has always been the Melbourne Cup but I believe that if

you are going for the Melbourne Cup you have to run in the Caulfield Cup," he said.

"She will run in the McKinnon Stakes (2000 m) before the Melbourne Cup." The w.f.a. \$75,000 L.K.S. McKinnon Stakes is run at Flemington three days before the Cup.

But owner Nick Columb, who bought Tristar in New Zealand as a yearling for \$135,000, expressed concern after the race about a Melbourne Cup penalty.

"She is small and lightly framed and I hope she doesn't get too much," he said.

Columb said after the race that he and his partners, P. Sheppard, G. Smorgon, J. Styles and A. White, had decided to retire Tristar to stud after she contested the Melbourne Cup.

He intends to send Tristar to the United States where she will be mated with a top stallion.

And Columb said that American interests recently offered \$1.5m. for Tristar.

The mare has raced only 21 times for five wins, two seconds and a third and has earned \$702,005.

Four of those victories have been in Group One events: the A.J.C. Derby, the w.f.a. Underwood Stakes, the w.f.a. Caulfield Stakes and the Caulfield Cup.

Meanwhile, runner-up Our Sophia also looks good for the Melbourne Cup after Saturday's game effort when she carried 51.5 kg as she drops 1 kg in the Melbourne Cup.

# State roster: Tig 'Dogs may me

Burnie and Coosee Football Club executives are likely to meet in the next few days to discuss possible amalgamation and entry into the proposed 1986 Statewide football roster.

Both clubs have called committee meetings tonight to discuss their meeting with the T.A.N.F.L. in Launceston on Saturday.

Burnie, Coosee and Devonport applied to join the Statewide roster but the T.A.N.F.L. has recommended Burnie and Coosee amalgamate and join Devonport as the two N.W.F.U. clubs in the competition.

The six T.A.N.F.L. clubs and two from the N.T.F.A. would form the remainder of the Statewide roster.

The bait being dangled in front of N.W.F.U. and N.T.F.A. clubs to join the Statewide competition is a \$400,000 sponsorship package.

The T.A.N.F.L. has offered to

attend a joint public meeting of Burnie and Coosee committees, players and supporters to outline the Statewide proposal.

Coosee secretary Kevin Leary said yesterday he anticipated Coosee and Burnie executives would get together to discuss amalgamation and the Statewide roster "to see if there is any future in it".

"The T.A.N.F.L. obviously wants a decision quickly so it can get guaranteed sponsorship," Mr Leary said.

"I think the two clubs owe it to the area, not just to Burnie and Coosee, to discuss it further."

Individual clubs spent more than an hour each in talks with T.A.N.F.L. officials on Saturday.
